The programme, an initiative of the Office of the Pro-Vice-Chancellor, Professor Narend Baijnath, is essentially a wide selection of customised and relevant learning initiatives that seek to encourage and inspire informal learning.

and 10 Unisa students served in the capacity of Chance 2 Advance learning ambassadors. A further 12 members of the community served as safety and security patrollers. Said Dr Genevieve James, Chance 2 Advance project leader: "Having received a taste of the joys and benefits of lifelong learning, the people of Diepsloot are now eagerly anticipating the return of the Chance 2 Advance programme. Unisa's image in the community is at an all-time high with members of the community seeking to register as Unisa students."

During the course of the year Diepsloot residents turned up in their numbers to attend the more than 100 courses presented by Unisa staff who were ably assisted by student learning ambassadors. On Friday, 28 September, great jubilation filled the air as the community of Diepsloot received their Chance 2 Advance certificates of participation. Despite the threatening weather, hundreds of participants steadily streamed into the venue during the course of the day to collect their much anticipated and highly appreciated certificates.

This year students numbered well over 12 000, and the programme required a mammoth logistical undertaking involving over 54 workshop facilitators who participated in workshops held at 8 strategically located venues across Diepsloot. A total of 35 members of the Diepsloot community
