- make academic judgements related to diagnostics, placements competence, progression and/or qualification completion; and as a feedback mechanism to improve curricula, known as assessment of learning; and to
- create opportunities for students to engage with the content, with their context, with the lecturer and with fellow students (Unisa Assessment Policy, 2011).

The Department of History is inviting suitable applicants for the positions of External Examiners who will be appointed as independent contractors on a yearly basis. We seek to appoint competent and suitable candidates to moderate assessments, evaluate and make recommendations on the scope and quality of the assessment strategies of the department, and perform such tasks professionally and ethically according to the Unisa Assessment Policy and Guidelines.

Requirements:

- Doctoral degree in History (NQF level 10)
- At least 3 years of applicable experience, including history teaching and content development at undergraduate and honours levels.
- Evidence of a sustained track record of research outputs in the field of History.

 - Valid permit (foreign applicants).
