Unisa and Times Higher Education (THE) to host impact forum that will explore ways to enhance quality education in Africa

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Africa is on track to surpass Asia as the continent which is home to the greatest number of young people. However, higher education in Africa is hindered by a chronic lack of investment, an unsustainable policy environment, competition from outside Africa for academic talent, international conflicts and a colonial legacy that has created multiple socio-economic challenges that higher education must respond to.

These are some of the issues that will occupy centre-stage at the Times Higher Education Impact Forum to be hosted jointly by the University of South Africa (Unisa) and Times Higher Education (THE) at the Unisa main campus in Pretoria next week. The forum will be held under the theme "Developing and enhancing quality education in Africa, which is based premised on the United Nations' Sustainable Development Goal (SDG) 4 on quality education.

Amongst the more than 30 leaders from the higher education sector who will be speaking at the event will be the Principal and Vice Chancellor of Unisa, Professor Puleng LenkaBula, Mr Martin Oosthuizen, the Executive Director of the Southern African Regional Universities Association (SARU) as well as former South African Statistician-General and Director of the Economic Modelling Academy, Dr Pali Lehohla.

There will also be four panel discussions that will debate issues such as student support, community engagement, technology and untapping the continent's huge potential as it is set to overtake Asia with more young people by the middle of this century.

The forum will also explore the following questions in depth:



- How higher education can meet the needs of learners from diverse communities, without discrimination.
- What higher education in Africa will look like by the middle of the century.
- What is needed to deliver quality teaching and learning in higher education in Africa.
- Collaborations with other sectors, including technology, Artificial Intelligence and business

The University Impact Forum is taking place three months after the release of THE's Impact Rankings 2023 which assesses universities against the UN's 17 SDGs. This year, two universities in Africa ranked first in individual SDGs. The Kwame Nkrumah University of Science and Technology came first for its contribution to SDG 4 (quality education), and the University of Johannesburg was placed first for their work in areas related to SDG 1 (no poverty).

The forum includes a masterclass examining THE's Impact Rankings metrics and methodology with a focus on university performance for SDG1 – no poverty; SD4 – quality education; SDG 8 – decent work and economic growth and SDG 10 – reduced inequalities.
