- Improve the quality of students' learning experiences by focusing on significant knowledge, skills, attitudes, and values, and providing motivation to work through the material through tasks and feedback, known as assessment for learning.
- Focus on the ability to transfer knowledge to new contexts and to apply knowledge in specific contexts in line with the NQF level descriptors and other taxonomies of learning.
- Focus on programmatic and graduate attributes and critical cross-field outcomes in the assessment of learning.
- Make academic judgments related to diagnostics, placements competence, progression and/or qualification completion; and as a feedback mechanism to improve curricula, known as assessment of learning; and to
- Create opportunities for students to engage with the content, with their context, with the lecturer and with fellow students (Unisa Assessment Policy, 2011).

The Department of Psychology is inviting suitable applicants for providing assessment services to be appointed as independent contractors (Markers) on a yearly basis. The purpose of this Independent Contractor's appointment is to appoint competent and suitable candidates to **mark** assessment tasks professionally and ethically align to the Assessment Policy and Guidelines.

Requirements:

- Applicable and relevant equivalent to NQF level 9 OR NQF level 10 in Psychology or related field.
- · At least 5-years teaching experience or relevant experience in the Psychology field (TVET College/ University)

- Mark assessment tasks professionally

On completion of the module, learners should be able to conceptualise community psychological applications, initiatives, and interventions through awareness of complex ethical dilemmas whilst building community and public awareness. PYC4808	Ecosystemic Psychology	Understanding the contexts in which we are a part and the worldviews from which we view the world are necessary for interactional and relational success. Ecosystemic Psychology highlights context, ecology and language as essential to human interactions. The purpose of PYC4808 is to introduce students to different worldviews (ontologies) and knowledge systems (epistemologies) that have and continue to contribute to the field of psychology, health and pathology; to appraise and understand the shift from individual psychology theories, towards systemic and cybernetic theories (ecosystemic) and Africancentred worldviews; as well as to develop skills in being able to apply and critique these different worldviews to different contexts.
